




# Genealogy and Local History Resources and Services



## What does “Special Collections” mean?

In most libraries, it refers to unique, fragile, or hard-to-find historical documents and resources. The subject matter of these resources is often genealogy and local history. Many Special Collections materials can be damaged by excessive use, heat, light, or moisture, and preservation is one of our most important concerns. For this reason, most of our materials cannot be checked out, but you are welcome to use them in our reading room. We are happy to take your inquiries and look forward to serving you! Our goal is to collect, preserve, and provide access to the history of Summit County, and to continue to maintain one of the area’s most extensive genealogy collections.



# Genealogy Resources

Whether you're new to genealogy or an experienced researcher, our collection can help! We have a large collection of how-to books that can be checked out with a valid Akron-Summit County Public Library card. Our resources concentrate on the eastern half of the United States; however, other regions are included. Many of our resources are on microfilm or CD-ROM. Books are arranged first by geographical location (state, county); then by type of record (cemeteries, marriages, or newspaper abstracts, for example). ## Summit County Sources (online access available where noted)

- Akron city directories from 1859, online up to 1968 through our Web site.
- Birth and death records and indexes, 1869–1908.
- Glendale Cemetery burial records 1839–1989
- Mt. Peace burial records 1880–1916, Springfield Township Cemetery transcriptions, and St. Vincent Cemetery transcriptions, online through our Web site.
- Cunningham Funeral Home records, 1906–1966.
- Estates, 1840–1958, and index 1840–1949.

- Index to deeds, grantors only, 1795–1840, including townships from Trumbull, Portage, Medina and Stark Counties that eventually became part of Summit County.

## United States Federal Census on Microfilm

(online access through Ancestry Library Edition and Heritage Quest)

- All available census records for Ohio, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Kentucky and Alabama through 1930.
- Partial census records for Connecticut, New York, Virginia, and eight other states.
- Extensive collection of printed indexes for most states, including available mortality and slave schedule indexes.



# Correspondence Service

In addition to providing telephone and in person reference services, we also offer a correspondence service to patrons. You can submit your genealogy or local history questions via postal mail or email at [speccollections@akronlibrary.org](mailto:speccollections@akronlibrary.org). All correspondence is answered within five weeks.

## Guidelines:

- Please include your full name and complete mailing address with each request.
- Please limit each request to five items and submit only two requests per month.
- Although Ohio death certificates (1908-1953) are freely available online through Family Search Labs (<http://fsbeta.familysearch.org>), we will continue to offer mailed photocopies for those who prefer this service. Your request should include each person's name, approximate date of death (at least the year) and, if available, the certificate number and county where the death occurred. To find the certificate number, you can use the Ohio Historical Society's online certificate index at <http://www.ohiohistory.com/dindex>. If you have access to Ancestry.com or Ancestry Library Edition, you may use the Ohio Deaths database.
- No fees are required up front for research services. An invoice will be sent with any requested photocopies. Our fee schedule includes a \$1.00 processing fee plus \$.05 for each copy.
- Please be as specific as possible in your research request, including sources you have already consulted and what information you already have.



## Parking:

- A parking deck is next to the Library at the corner of Market and High Streets. You can enter the Library directly from the second floor of the parking deck. Parking is \$1.00 per 30 minutes and maximum fee is \$6.25 (as of August 2010). Library patrons receive the first hour free. Take your ticket stub to the second floor security desk to be stamped before exiting the Library. The parking deck is free on weekdays if arriving after 6 pm, and on Saturdays and Sundays.

## Personal Items:

- Temperature is kept cool. As with most special libraries, layers and an extra sweater are always a good idea.
- Self-serve lockers are located in the Special Collections Division. Lockers are free but do use a quarter key-return. A coat rack is also available.
- Containers such as purses and tote bags may be brought into the research area. However, these items will need to be stored in a locker if you are using manuscript, photograph, or other archival collections.
- Pencils, binders, notebooks and laptop computers are welcome. Pens are not permitted in the research area.
- Check with a staff member regarding use of cameras and hand held scanners.



## Technology:

- Public computers with Internet access are available in Special Collections. While the public may use the computers in Special Collections, priority is given to genealogy and local history patrons.
- We are laptop friendly with plenty of outlets and wireless Internet access.
- You will need an Akron-Summit County Public Library card to use the Internet and research databases at the Main Library or any of the 17 branches. Anyone living, working, or attending school in Ohio may obtain a FREE library card by registering at Main Library, a branch library, or the bookmobile. Stop at the checkout desk on the first or second floor to obtain a library card.
